TRAILBLAZER FOR DISABILITY RIGHTS: JENNIFER KEELAN-CHAFFINS





Jennifer Keelan-Chaffins isn't just an advocate; she's a force of nature in the fight for disability rights. Joining the movement at the tender age of six, Jennifer made history at eight by participating in the legendary "Capitol Crawl" protest, a pivotal moment in the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Her early activism earned her the prestigious ADA Award from The Task Force on the Rights and Empowerment of Americans with Disabilities in 1990. Jennifer's dedication to education is as impressive as her activism. She earned her GED in 2002 and an Associate of Arts Degree in 2008 from Arapahoe Community College, before obtaining a Bachelor of Science Degree in Family and Human Development from Arizona State University in 2017. Today, Jennifer is a powerhouse educator and motivational speaker, owning Jennifer Keelan-Chaffins LLC since May 2020. She educates audiences about the ADA, the Capitol Crawl, and the broader disability rights movement, emphasizing education, advocacy, and empowerment. Residing in Colorado with her Service Dog Mya and live-in aide, Jennifer continues to inspire and lead.

Dr. Steffi Kim is a licensed clinical community psychologist and has worked with Alaska Native communities employing community-based participatory research frameworks for almost a decade. In her work with Alaska Native Elders, she collaborates closely with community stakeholders and Elders to learn and share how Elders age well within rural and urban Alaskan communities. This work has provided valuable insights into a successful aging framework incorporating and highlighting the voices of Alaska Native Elders. Together with community partners, Dr. Kim works to promote dementia awareness, brain health, and reduce the stigma associated with dementia. In addition to her work with Alaska Native Elders, Dr. Kim has worked with adults providing mental health services.



Julie Raymond-Yakoubian

Julie is a Home Funeral Guide, End-of-Life Doula, ordained Reverend, funeral celebrant, and anthropologist. She enjoys assisting people in thinking through their end-of-life planning and options and is honored to guide families through home funerals for their loved ones. James Drayton

James began his leadership career while in the United States Army. After his military career, James was the Operations Director of a 99-bed mental health rehabilitation center. In 2009 he moved to Alaska and began work with Southcentral Foundation as an Administrator for their behavioral health residential services program. In 2012 James joined State of Alaska, Department of Senior and Health Services as a Compliance Investigator with Program Integrity. Currently James is the CEO of Heritage Health, LLC which operates 6 Assisted Living Homes (serving seniors, those with mental disabilities and mental illnesses) and an adult day program.



Julie Drayton

Julie began her career in Residential Services when she was in college. Prior to moving to Alaska in 2009, Julie was the Program Director of a 99-bed mental health rehabilitation center.
